


1. LAKE MORPHOMETRY: refers to the size and shape of the lake basin, and can affect the physical, chemical and biological processes of the lake. A lake's morphometry can be best described by a bathymetric map.



2. FLUSHING RATE: refers to the number of times a lake flushes (volume of water equal to the lake's volume passes through the lake) in one year, expressed to the nearest 0.1 times/year. Lakes have low flushing rates compared to rivers and streams, which are constantly replenishing their water volume, which leaves lakes more vulnerable to the accumulation of pollutants and nutrients.

3. PHOSPHORUS RETENTION COEFFICIENT: The phosphorus retention coefficient can be defined as the fraction of inflowing phosphorus that is not lost through outflow and retained within the water body.

4. TROPIC CLASSIFICATION: generally refers to the biological production, or how aged a lake is. NH uses four indicators to determine a lake's trophic status. Those are dissolved oxygen, chlorophyll-a, transparency, and vascular aquatic plant growth. Oligotrophic lakes tend to be deeper, larger lakes with clear water, rocky or sandy shorelines, low phosphorus enrichment, limited rooted plant growth, low algal growth and adequate dissolved oxygen throughout. Mesotrophic waters are an intermediate category with characteristics between oligotrophic and eutrophic water bodies. Eutrophic waters are smaller, shallower ponds with mucky bottoms, extensive rooted plant growth, and depleted dissolved oxygen in bottom waters; often tea-colored and sometimes murky from planktonic algal growth.



5. EXOTIC SPECIES: plants and/or animals that are not native to a specific region and once introduced, typically have no natural enemies to keep populations in check. In lakes, exotic aquatic plants, such as Variable milfoil, can quickly out-compete native plants for resources and have detrimental affects on the lake ecosystem. Currently, 72 lakes/ponds in NH are infested with an exotic species. WATERBODY REPORT CARD TABLES Water Quality Assessment Outcomes

Since the *Clean Water Act* took effect in 1987, it requires that every state submit two surface water quality assessment documents to the EPA every two years. Included in these reports is a list of waters (Section 303d list) that do not meet water quality standards thus, they are impaired or not supporting their designated uses.

This represents the uses a waterbody (lake, river, estuary) should support. There are seven designated uses: aquatic life, fish consumption, shellfish consumption, drinking water, primary contact recreation, secondary contact recreation, and wildlife.	If data collected for a specific parameter routinely do not meet accepted criteria, then a waterbody is considered to be impaired for that designated use. Alternately, if data meet accepted criteria, the waterbody fully supports the designated use.	The physical, chemical or biological parameter used to assess whether a waterbody supports a specific designated use.	Depicts how well the designated use is supported based on thresholds assigned to the parameter. There are several categories from fully supported to severely impaired. Category ratings of Bad and Slightly Bad indicate the use is impaired. A category rating of Encouraging indicates additional data are needed. Category ratings of Good or Very Good mean data support the use.

Lake Hosts are trained by NH Lakes Association and help us keep nasty things out of Crescent Lake. Volunteers/paid hosts are at least age 17, able to conduct a complete boat inspection.



BEING A LAKE


He has never dreamed of being a lake



In With the New, But Maybe Not Out With the Old?

Most of you know that BCNU, the erstwhile lakeside store at what is now map site 108, was razed last fall as too far gone to repair. I'm happy to report that there's a lovely new house there, now complete with the old BCNU sign.

So many of our oldest camps are disappearing! While it definitely brings our community to a new level and builds the terrific population of year-rounders, it's still sort of hard to see the old places go.

There's a group project aimed at saving the bare-bones early 1900s yellow and green cottage formerly at map site 105, where Kim and Dave Howley have built another gorgeous new home. When the old place refused to cede its soul to the bulldozer that came to tear it down, we hatched a last minute plan to move it to my land, just next door. The Howleys graciously donated the building provided we could move it without impeding progress on their own construction.

The move was a saga in itself, and if we're lucky I'll be able to meet the setback requirements to keep this little old beauty near where it now sits. Acworth approvals still to come (I hope) but if all works out we'll have an unofficial headquarters for the not-yet-official Crescent Lake Historical Society. AWAY FROM THE LAKE.....

Why not take a hike.....

When you've had enough lake fun (is there such a thing?) and are looking for something to do on dry land, there are plenty of hiking options available within a short drive from the area. Last year we mentioned Mt. Ascutney, Mt. Sunapee, Mt. Monadnock, Silver Mountain, and the "Goshen Ocean". We've discovered several other trails this past year, all just a short drive away.

Chesterfield Gorge is a wonderful, fairly level, .7 mile hike located on Route 9, west of Keene. A little "Flume Gorge" located just an hour or so away. Pair this with a visit to Pisgah State Park just 15 minutes away and you've got a full day. Pisgah has plenty of well-marked trails covering over 13,000 acres. We liked Kilbourn Loop Trail and Pisgah Mountain Trail this Spring. At the top you'll have beautiful views of Mount Monadnock to the east and Massachusetts and Vermont to the southwest.

More challenging is Smarts Mountain in Lyme. It's a small peak (3,240 ft.) that feels and hikes like a bigger mountain. Views of the upper Connecticut Valley, the Green Mountains, and the White Mountains will greet you at the summit on a clear day. Stop at the ledges for views and be sure to climb the fire tower! Use the trail maps found online to plan your visit. We followed the Appalachian trail up and the Ranger Trail down.

Pillsbury State Park is another favorite. Located on Route 31 in Washington, there are a variety of trails to choose from. We took the Five Summers Trail to a very nice view where we ate lunch. This is not a steep trail, but it is rather lengthy. A shorter hike would be the Balanced Rock Trail to Balanced Rock. Or a combination of the two, perhaps! This park does have a nominal entrance fee, so be prepared. New Hampshire residents over the age of 65 are admitted free of charge with ID.

We do have a group of hikers from the lake that try to get out and hike a couple of times a week in the summer. If you're interested in being added to the email list, please let me know: Lakahn19@gmail.com.

July 9, 2016, 10:00AM
Unity Fire Dept.

1. President, Kevin Brenker, called the meeting to order, Pledge of Allegiance and introduction of officers. There were 85 members in attendance.
2. A Moment of Silence was observed for those members who had passed in the last year: Arlene Bates, Marie Boyle, Marjy Dow, Paul Graves and Betty Sperzel
3. Secretary's Report: 2015 Annual Meeting Minutes were distributed. Membership Forms help to keep contact information current for emergency purposes and keeping the Directory up to date, which has almost 100% participation. Thank you to Patty Lahaise for personally visiting every new resident with a CL Welcome Packet that includes CLA and environmental information. There are currently have 16 CL properties on the market.
4. Treasurer's Report: Greta Perry, Treasurer distributed a Financial Statement dated 5/31/16. Report passed unanimously.
5. Welcome and Introduction to New Owners: Ryan Beaulieu, 106 Anderson Rd.; Athan and Karen Chekas, 46 Emerson Rd.; Dan and Gail Freer, 24 Shorewood Estates Rd.; Fran & Erin Kuehn, 100 Crescent Lake Rd.; Chris & Amy Lavina, 178 Crescent Lake Rd.; Chris and KT Myles, 30 Lake Rd.; Allen & Darlene Wachter, 34 Shorewood Estates Rd.; Mike & Susan Mulhern, 206 Crescent Lake Rd.
6. Election of Officers: Moved and seconded to nominate Patty LaHaise Shorewood Director Three Years (2016-2019), Passed unanimously. Moved and seconded to re-elect Greta Perry, Treasurer (2016-2019). Passed unanimously.

7. COMMITTEE REPORTS

AIS Kevin Brenker announced that a new NH law has been passed in the Senate and looks likely to be in effect next Spring which will make it mandatory that boat drain plugs be removed after leaving every body of water.

Milfoil Swim Organized by Stan Rastallis this Spring, before the seeds exploded. Crescent Lake shows no sign of invasive plants. Several lake residents participated. This activity is open to anyone who wants to join in.

Water Quality Testing Stan Rastallis reported that cost \$400 and was excellent. Specific results can be found on line NH Dept. of Environmental Services. He noted some phosphate in a tributary area, which has been there for 20 years with no explanation, and dissipates in the Lake. Next test is Monday, 7/11/16.

Lake Host Program directed by Kevin Brenker, has 6 paid lake hosts and 6 volunteers, which gives us excellent coverage at the Boat Ramp. He noted that Crescent Lake is one of a few lakes in NH that have no invasive species. He thanked Judy and Gary Robinson for volunteering to do payroll. Mike Kahn noted that we need to let our renters know that launching boats, canoes, kayaks, paddleboats, etc. should all pass through inspection at the Boat Ramp, not only to protect water quality, but also so that we get credit from the State.

CLA Golf Tournament Dave Sloan has set the date for July 16, 2016 at 7:30 am, cash only, at the Newport Country Club. Men, women and children are welcome.

T-Shirts Pat Flanagan's 2016 design won the contest. Diane Brenker noted that after the meeting all t-shirts and CL items for sale will be available at the T-Shirt Shack. Hours will be noted on CL Facebook Page. Kevin Brenker thanked Gary and Judy Robinson for the use of their shed for the t-shirt sales at 188 Crescent Lake Rd.

Maps Kevin thanked Charlie Clauss for updating the 2016 maps and to Mike and Diane Walker for donating the printing of the maps. He noted that not only do these maps provide the property owners with information, but also the Unity and Acworth Fire and Rescue Depts use them for emergencies.

Chronicles Kevin Brenker thanked Colleen Kaftan for her past dedication to the Chronicles, and to Nancy LeBlanc, who volunteered to be editor this year. Kevin also thanked Colleen for being so diligent in sending out blitz emails.

Website Kevin thanked Larry McCluskey for keeping our website up to date.

Picnic Mary Beth Gilpen announced that the Annual Labor Day Picnic will be held at Desbien's, 86 Crescent Lake Road, on Saturday, 9/3/16, at 1:00. Members are asked to make a "basket" of goodies for the auction, which funds the event. Flares will be available this year for sale, which should be lit around the Lake for the boat parade.

Canoe Races - information to be announced at a later date.

Fred Yates made a motion to change the name of the Picnic back to "Annual Crescent Lake Association Picnic."
Seconded and passed.

5K Run/Walk will be held on Sunday, 9/4/16, starting at the Boat Ramp. Donations of \$20/runners and \$10/walkers go to Homes for our Troops. Last year there were 35 participants. Looking for a business sponsor to pay for the t-shirts.

OLD BUSINESS

Lake Safety concerns were made by Trina Janeczek, noting that they are at the narrowest point of the Lake and see many close calls. Discussion brought out the following points: motor boats should hug the black marker, non-motorized boats and swimmers need to stay close to shore and not in the boat lane, paddleboards must have life vests, canoes and kayaks must have lights on at night. It was generally stated that we use common sense and courtesy.

5K Run/Walk Sue Patton made a motion that the t-shirts be funded by CLA in an amount not to exceed \$250. The motion was seconded and passed.

Raffle Quilt Nancy LeBlanc reported that this year's raffle is a t-shirt quilt from past CL T-shirts, made by members. Tickets are \$5, or 5 tickets for \$20. They will be on sale until the Labor Day Picnic, where the winning ticket will be drawn.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:55 am.



Apparently no other lake association conducts a “Swim” which looks for any out-of-place growth from previous inspections. Our annual “swim” takes place on June 24th.

There is a unique sense of community associated with Crescent Lake property owners and CLA members. Need a special tool or help with a particular challenge? Someone around you will have a solution and available time to assist [cast a stone here...]. This sense of community drives a level of resilience – the ability to bounce back from an event – not found in many other lake associations. Recently, friends visited and commented on this sense of community which is not replicated in their Sunapee Lake association.

Now that we are finally seated in the “warmer season” with a marked increase in lake activity, take a moment to observe the random acts of kindness displayed across this community. Not seasonally related, but more visible in the summer months, there are CLA “ambassadors” [cast several stones here...] that help us create large outward community ripples by their selfless works for others. The summer season also charges us with the understanding that more activity increases the potential for any type of accident, on or off the water. We’re out doing more, riding bikes, kayaking under the stars, hiking any number of great local trails. Stay safe during this warm season, and watch out on the water for anyone who might benefit for a little Crescent 34Lake 101 – safe boating advice.

Thanks to a host of dedicated people who keep this Chronicle active, relevant and of interest, as well as those who volunteer for our many vital committees. They cast their own stone, creating new ripples every week. Thanks to all of you for recognizing those who dedicate so much time and effort as stewards of this unique Crescent Lake community.
