This house, across from Silver Beach burnt down. It was owned by Alice Moniz. Below is how it looks today.

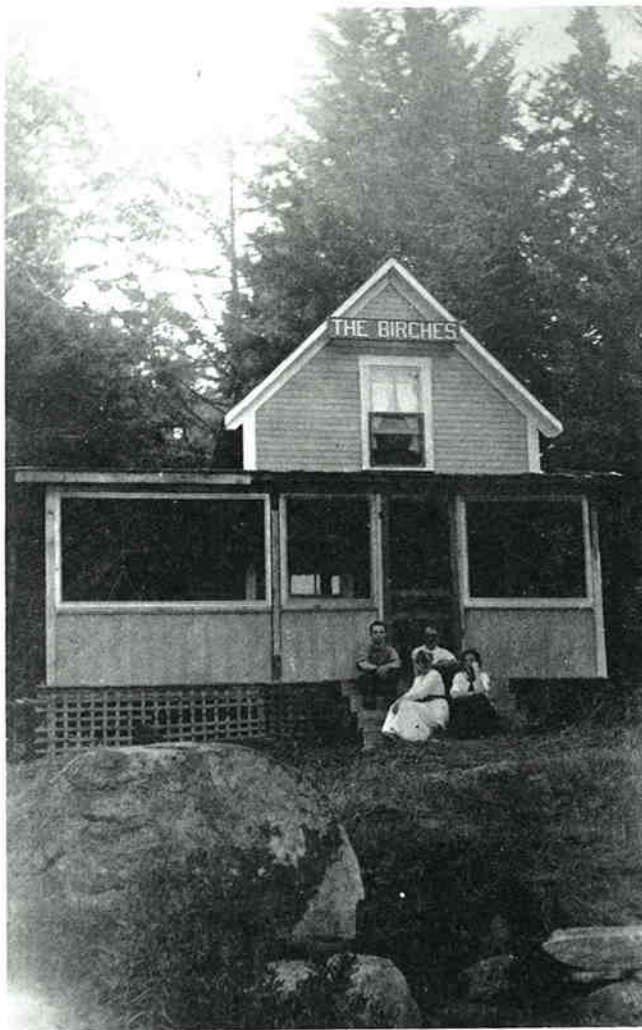




Doctor McPherson, the original owner, was a doctor of "nervous diseases". There were small stucco houses behind the main house for his patients.

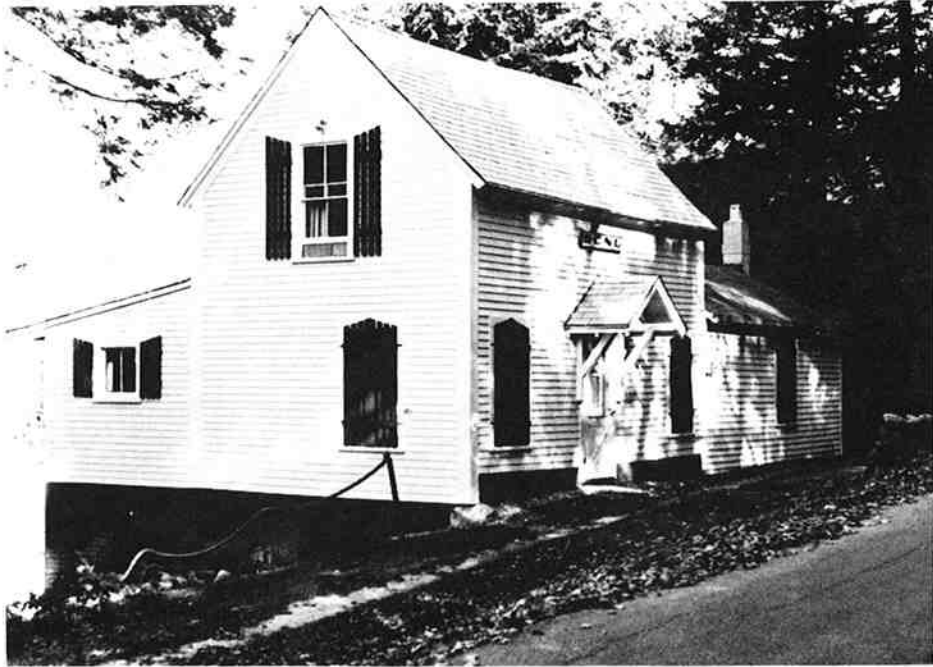

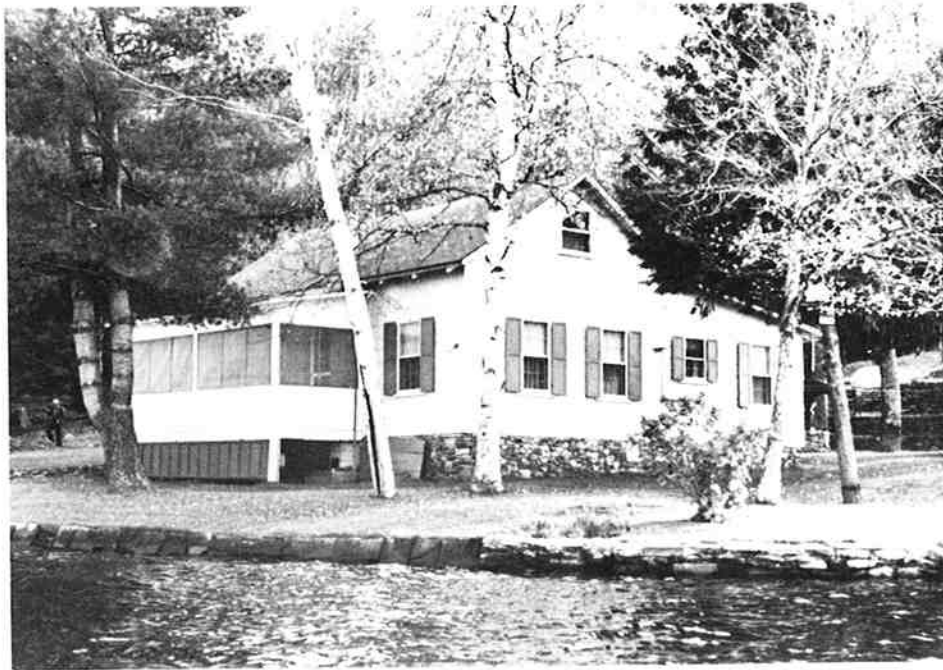

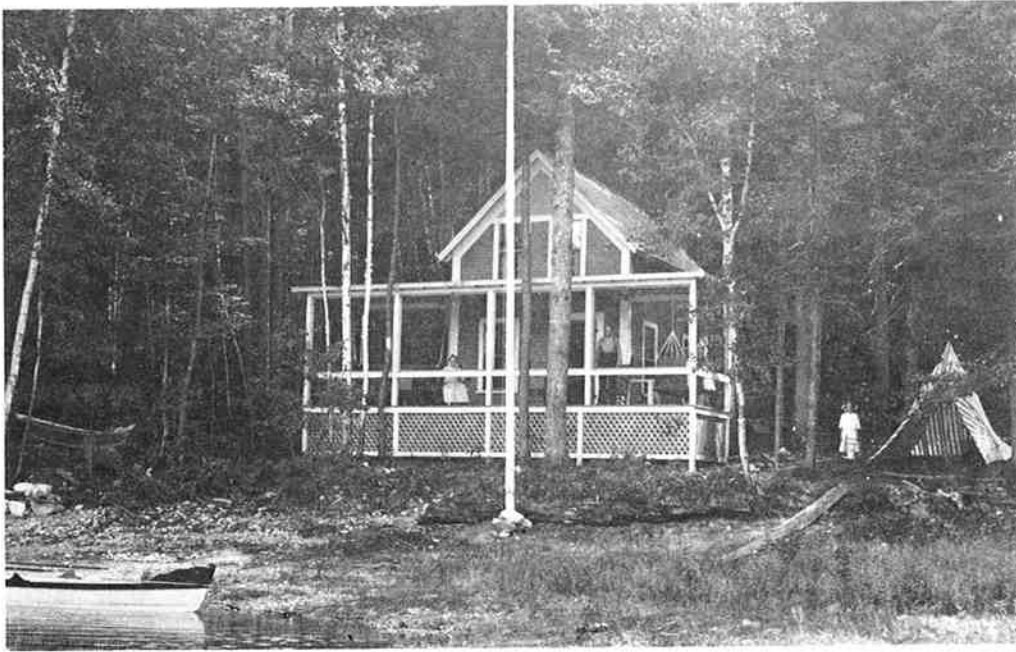
